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Visualization of 2 centuries of ocean journeys #aeasea

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Where are we going?

Understandable if we're afraid, mobile exploded & took us off guard
#AEASEA

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Nobody can effectively point to where we're going #AEASEA

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One recent change we've done has been from page to patterns.
Modular design principles #AEASEA

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This is a huge shift from how we used to think about web design.
Grid-first design #AEASEA

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Now our work begins a level below the page, below the grid
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Trade the control in photoshop for a new kind of control: flexible grids flexible images media queries to build a network of content

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The patterns in our designs may have little responsive designs in themselves, to stitch together to build pages [#AEASEA](#)

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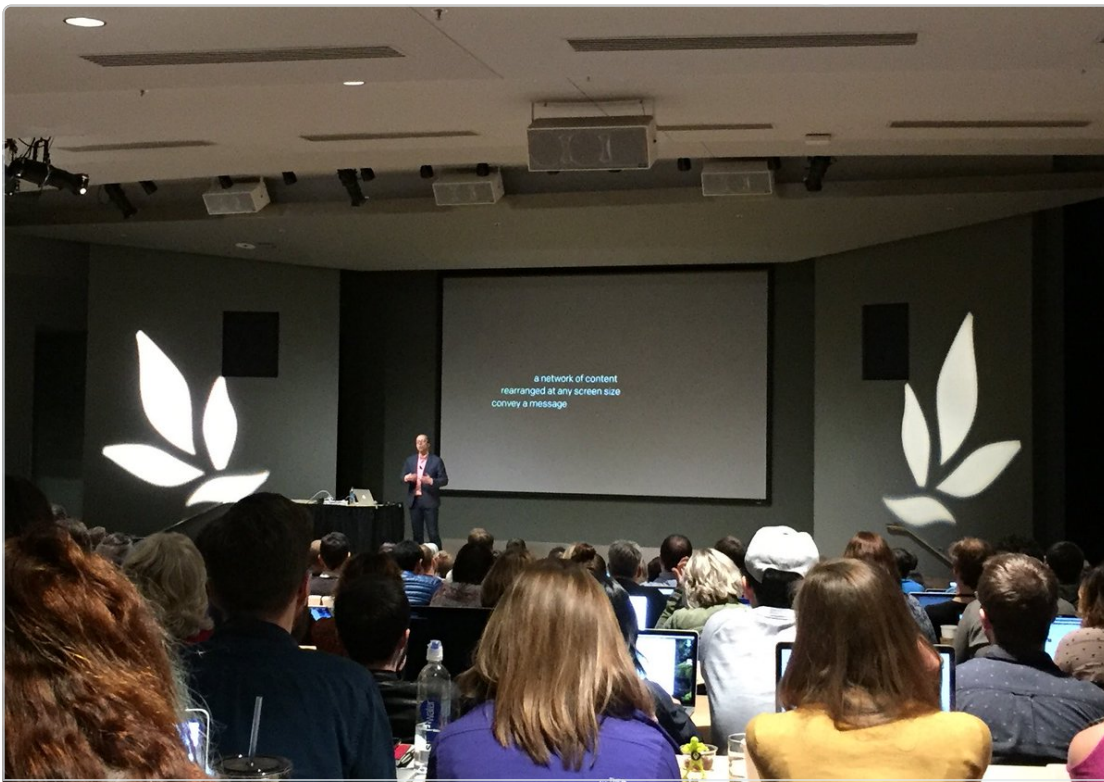
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Pattern-driven design is the biggest change in [@beep](#)'s work, even bigger than [@RWD](#) [#AEASEA](#)

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“The teaser” - in its simplest is a headline with a link. often has an image. #AEASEA

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“I design patterns (small responsive designs themselves) that ultimately stitch together to create pages.” @beep #aeasea

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From a structural standpoint all of these pieces are identical and have pieces added on depending on the design #AEASEA

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If we translated a design directly based onto its display, we might put code in order of display #AEASEA

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“What if someone doesn’t browse the web like I do?” This question checks default assumptions & biases #AEASEA

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My view of encountering the web isn’t representative of everyone’s view of the web #AEASEA

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Excellent reminder from @beep to focus on priority before you focus on layout #aeasea

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If the most important piece is the headline, lead with that. If the comment count is least important end with it [#AEASEA](#)

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Once the markup structure is in place, mirror it in the HTML, then use CSS to visually rearrange with flexbox [#AEASEA](#)

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If a browser understands flexbox, move the comments to another location [#AEASEA](#)

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Build a baseline structure and layout, conditionally enhance it to the final refined design [#AEASEA](#)

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If the test relies on javascript, it's a bit fragile to use as a test.
Feature queries [@supports](#) rules help us test w/o javascript

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If Guardian user doesn't pass Javascript test, they still get a baseline foundational layout w/access for everyone #AEASEA

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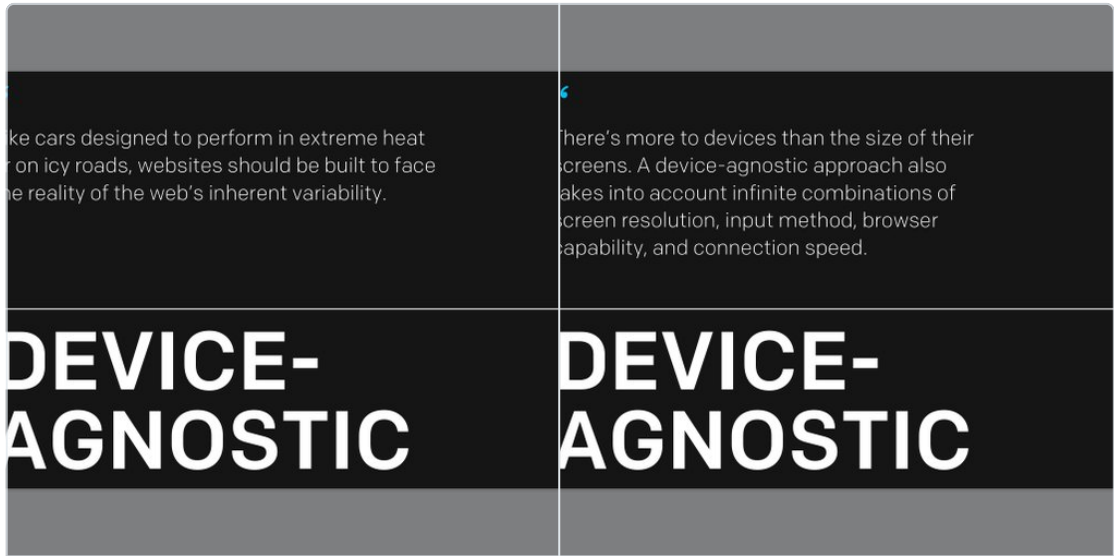
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A well-crafted responsive design has to be device-agnostic by default. #AEASEA

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Trent Walton talks about how we have to be prepared for infinite and changing design #AEASEA

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Non-ideal net and browsing experiences: we need to talk about them! #AEASEA

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3 most common words on a responsive design project are mobile, tablet, and desktop... which are useless #AEASEA

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Everyone has a slightly different definition of “mobile”. But specific design conditions we should talk about #AEASEA

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Input method, screen size, network speed, network conditions... these are conditions and features, not devices. Talk about them. #AEASEA

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“Mobile” might mean small screen, but doesn’t mean “slow” or “unreliable” necessarily. Desktops aren’t necessarily fast. #AEASEA

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Commuters using 3G on the train may have a wide screen but slow and spotty connection #AEASEA

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Ensure something usable is there for everyone - a single-column mobile-friendly layout. Design for the non-ideal #AEASEA

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Text-heavy websites might be the easiest, but this works for transactional interfaces #AEASEA

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A not-totally-ideal baseline experience will still give access that can be improved #AEASEA

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Device-agnostic design patterns should be as responsive *and* as resilient as possible #AEASEA

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The dirty little secret about responsive design is that it's not the hard part anymore. #AEASEA

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The biggest challenge that we face is documenting and communicating how, why, and when we do what we do for responsive design #AEASEA

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Starbucks launched a responsive redesign *and* publicly launched their style guide #AEASEA

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Ushahidi provides a pattern library online used globally #AEASEA

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A style guide or pattern library has become the de facto artifact to come out of a responsive redesign #AEASEA

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Benefits

Central shared repository of front-end patterns and code

Bridges “the collaboration gap” between design & dev #AEASEA

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Helps onboarding new team members with the design language

Helps facilitate in-browser design, review, and testing #AEASEA

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How to build a style guide
Create a visual inventory
Pattern naming and organizing
Translating inventory into html and CSS #AEASEA

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1. Visual inventory. Either when start or near end, find all the unique patterns that are in the site. #AEASEA

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Translate that inventory into HTML and CSS #AEASEA

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Automate as much as you can #AEASEA

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Styleguide by Devbridge rely on comments in the code to identify patterns [#AEASEA](#)

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Fractal - by Clearleft - component-first design process. Geared toward integrating style guides into sites & products [#AEASEA](#)

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Airbnb “airshots” lets them work in-house to automate style guides [#AEASEA](#)

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Polynesian tradition for navigation uses a star compass. #AEASEA

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The center of the compass is the boat, and the edges are the stars.
The chant was how they learned #AEASEA

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Shared and common language in a chant, but it's the most
consistent method to learn possible. #AEASEA

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Internalizing the sky lets them make decisions when they're not
staring at the star compass #AEASEA

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Challenges: when to reuse, how to make patterns distinct, how to avoid duplication... naming & language #AEASEA

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(Yes this means you need to information architect your style guides just like you information architect the output of them) #AEASEA

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Cobbler's kids have no shoes, and style guides often get neglected information architecture.



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Atomic Design by Brad Frost is a great metaphor for style guides. Atoms to molecules to organisms #AEASEA

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When we put it into practice, the atomic design language can make things muddy #AEASEA

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"There are only two hard things in Computer Science: cache invalidation and naming things." Shared vocabulary and language matters. #aeasea

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Is a search box that expands an atom? No... but it's not a full page layout. Is it a molecule or an organism? #AEASEA

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This isn't a life-threatening issue whether a complex component is a molecule or an organism. But it's a problem #AEASEA

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A group glossary for a project may be an answer #AEASEA

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The naming of components can interfere with the team's ability to use it. Success or failure hinges on the words used [#AEASEA](#)

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Before you commit to any metaphor ensure everyone is using it the same way - clarity and agreement [#AEASEA](#)
